Donald Watkins






Satchmo At The Waldorf

ACTING

The Acting emphasis provides rigorous acting training in a liberal-arts setting, with classes focusing on Stanislavski, Meisner, Shakespeare, Auditions and Acting for the Camera. Students will have the opportunity to audition for shows from the start of their freshman year. By the end of the student's education at Greensboro College, actors will be fully prepared to take the next step towards graduate school, internships, or work in the professional theatre.



DESIGN & TECH

Students train in the art of design and technical production with equipment that mirrors the regional professional production work they will experience after graduation. They have the opportunity to work in all areas of Technical Production in order to develop all the tools they need to pursue careers professionally or in graduate theatre programs.

DANCE MINOR

Students who minor in Dance study in technique classes - ballet, tap, and jazz, as well as choreography and special topics (ballroom, hip-hop, modern, etc.). There are performance opportunities each semester. The dance minor is open and available to all Greensboro College students.

MUSICAL THEATRE

The Musical Theatre concentration provides intensive training from the Acting, Dance, Music, and Voice faculty. Performance opportunities include the Musical Theatre Ensemble, Cabaret Performance Class, Junior and Senior Recitals, and Main Stage productions. Created and taught by working Theatre professionals, this program offers our graduates the ability to enter the profession confident in themselves and their training.





COSTUMING

The Costuming concentration gives students hands-on experience in cutting, draping, sewing, serging, and patterning in garments used in yearly productions. Students learn the design process, including costume plots, renderings, and shop management, and are trained to design for main stage and student-directed productions.

THEATRE EDUCATION

Theatre Education students are trained in all aspects of theatre — costuming, design, performance, and more, with an emphasis on management and leadership positions. Projects include student-directed productions to be performed at area schools and on campus. Students in the Theatre Education concentration will also complete a number of fieldwork teaching experiences with various age groups, culminating in a semester of full-time student teaching.

DIRECTING

Students on the directing track are immediately afforded hands-on opportunities to practice their craft within studio classes. Directing assignments in the department's main stage season are available. Guidance and mentorship comes from our seasoned professors and also from the college's relationships within the nearby professional world.

STAGE MANAGEMENT

Students will take a combination of courses taught by both professors and professionals actively working in the area. Training includes opportunities to stage manage and production manage fully realized performances. Internships are often available at Triad Stage, the North Carolina Theatre Conference, and the Southeastern Theatre Conference to prepare students for opportunities in professional theatre or graduate school.
